
In this edition of *Vision* you will be able to read about the many exciting opportunities offered to our students throughout their time at King James.

There are many reasons to choose King James I Academy for your child's Secondary education - high quality teaching, excellent facilities, a diverse curriculum and a friendly environment are just a few of them. But if you need more proof, the families of 188 students who have joined us in Year 7 this this year can't be wrong.

In terms of official judgement, Ofsted we were graded 'Good' across all five areas in our last Ofsted inspection, which took place in 2017. Judged under the new, more stringent rules, this is an excellent achievement.

We pride ourselves on the high quality of teaching in our Academy; teachers are creative in their approach to lessons to make sure that students remain engaged and challenged, and they help students to achieve excellent results year after year.

Our Academy boasts excellent facilities, including seven large Science laboratories, a detached Art Hub with exhibition space, a Dance Studio and Main Hall to accommodate Drama performances, and state-of-the-art Sports facilities including a multi-sports indoor gym and floodlit 4G pitch. We also have a well-equipped library and a specialist Learning Support Unit, and this year we will be opening a brand nurture centre called 'The Pavilion'.

We have an extensive team of support staff and mentors who make sure that students are supported both academically and emotionally throughout their school life. From targeted booster sessions to action plans to build confidence or self-esteem, our Support Team make sure that all students get the individual help that they need.

Our curriculum is diverse; we offer a wide variety of both academic and vocational subjects which ensures that all of our young people can discover their individual talents and plan for a successful future. When the time comes to choose their options in Year 9, students benefit from individual career guidance from our Careers Officer; this makes sure that they are studying the correct subjects to enable them to achieve their goals.

All departments offer exciting opportunities for learning outside of the classroom and for developing life skills. Students regularly visit museums, galleries and Universities to enhance their learning; they also attend field trips and take part in both local and national competitions as part of their studies. Talks from industry practitioners give pupils a different perspective and a realistic insight into many aspects of their learning, and there are many opportunities to work alongside respected organisations and local businesses. Students can also take part in the many UK and international residential trips.

When the time comes, we can also offer an excellent Sixth Form experience with a diverse choice of subjects and tailored support to make sure students achieve their full potential. This year, our Sixth Form was top of the league table in the North East for value added, with a score of 0.52!

Year 7 Chromebook Scheme

n Thursday 20th September, our new Year 7 students will be invited to attend a special event to collect their personal Chromebook.

Our Chromebook initiative was launched in 2016 with computers issued to every Year 7. We wanted to ensure that all of our students were able to access computer technology not only in lessons but also at home; this is particularly important in a world which relies so heavily on technology. Now in its third year, all students in Years 7-9 have their own laptop and we are confident that the result of this will

Following these two fun-packed days, students were more than ready to embrace the next transition opportunity at Weardale Adventure Centre. The centre offered the chance to try a range of outdoor activities including canoeing, climbing, high ropes and underground exploration in a safe, residential environment.

Activities were designed to both thrill and challenge our new starters, and it was excellent to see their level of confidence and self-esteem soar as they proved to themselves that they can achieve anything with a little courage and determination.

Year upon year, our Transition Programme has proved to be hugely successful. It begins with our No Wasted Weeks initiative, which sees new starters attend King James one day each week to experience lessons and accustom themselves to Academy routines. Next, three consecutive days in school allows students to meet their Tutor and Form Group; combined with our Summer School, this ensures that all new starters have plenty of friends and feel confident from day one.

Begins in Year 1

We believe that successful transition to secondary school begins early in primary school. **V** early in primary school. We organise a wide variety of Outreach events and activities for pupils in Years 1-5 so they can experience life at King James. Year 5 Curriculum Week is one of the most important events for our local youngsters, who will soon be making the move.

Around 600 pupils from 12 local primary schools joined us for Year 5 Curriculum Week this year. Students attended King James to enjoy a full range of taster sessions and learning experiences, which were preselected by their own Head Teacher.

Our visitors took part in a wide selection of lessons, all designed to give them a taste of secondary school life, King James style. We are proud of our innovative approach to lesson delivery across all departments, and Year 5s were able to experience this in familiar subjects such as Maths, English, Science, History, Geography and Art. They also had the opportunity to try some subjects that primary schools are often unable to deliver including Business, ICT, Photography, Performing Arts, Food Technology and Music.

In our Library, pupils combined creative writing with comic art to design and produce a page from a comic book; and in Performing Arts, they learned Brazilian-inspired dance routines, which they then performed as a

group in our Main Hall. There were many opportunities for hands-on learning; in Food Technology they prepared healthy snacks and in Photography they learned about composition and developed technical skills in the use of DSLR cameras. They also learned some basic guitar and keyboard in our Music Department, enjoyed a variety of practical experiments in our huge Science laboratories and took part in team games and sports on our 4G pitch. There was even an opportunity to develop team working skills in a tentbuilding session!

Year 5 Curriculum Week introduces primary pupils to the idea of secondary school and helps them to feel excited about the next stage in their education. The experience familiarises them with the many different subjects which are taught by different teachers, a much larger school building, and the idea of travelling to school by coach or mini-bus. We hope our visiters enjoyed themselves and look forward to meeting them again at our Open Evening event this month.

Excellent A'Level results have helped 100% of Sixth Formers who applied for places at a range of Universities, to move on to their placement of choice. GCSE SUCCESS

Our most recent speaker was newly-qualified Midwife, Roz Middleton, pictured below, who talked about Midwifery in the NHS. The session attracted a large number of students who were all interested to hear about the qualifications needed to gain a place on a Midwifery course at University and what the training involved.

Mrs Middleton discussed the high entry requirements needed for Midwifery courses and explained why extensive medical knowledge is needed. Many think only of the obvious joy of midwifery as a profession but the reality of the job is that even in modern day childbirth, things don't always

go according to plan and often difficult medical decisions have to be made to save lives.

She also talked candidly about the many rewards and challenges of the job, and even found an innovative way to demonstrate contractions using balloons! Our eager students were able to ask questions at the end of the session and many left inspired to pursue a career in medicine.

So far this year, students have also attended informative sessions on careers within the Royal Navy; Optometry careers in a session delivered by Specsavers; and roles in Business with Akzonobel.

Hands-on Geography

ver 40 GCSE Geography students have enjoyed a field trip to Keswick as part of their studies. The town, which was devastated by floods in both 2005 and 2009, now has a £6 million flood protection scheme, which makes it the perfect location to study flood defences.

Students were able to look closely at the defence strategies put in place by the Environment Agency, including flood walls, embankments and flood gates, which significantly reduce the risk of flooding from the River Greta.

The group also conducted studies into tourism and the

effect that this has upon the town in terms of traffic, footfall and generating income for local businesses, which target tourists who visit the Lake District all year round. It was clear that tourism is hugely beneficial to the local economy, but students also considered the potential negative impact for local residents.

NINTH IN THE WORLD

in Language Perfect 2018!

his year, 191 different schools from across the world took part in the 2018 Language Perfect global linguistic competition and we placed ninth overall!

Over 70 students from King James took part, logging in over a 10-day period as many times as they wished, both at school and independently at home. Their progress was tracked online as they learned new vocabulary and translated texts, enhancing their knowledge in both French and Spanish. Points were earned for completing each task, and at the end of the competition period these points were converted into certificates and awards.

35 students achieved certificates for their efforts an seven of the those who took part obtained the prestigious Emerald Award, which places them in the top 1% of the 350,000 competitors that took part this year. This is a fantastic result and we are extremely proud of their achievement which placed King James ninth in the world overall!

Nurturing a love of **SHAKESPEARE**

ur Year 8 Nurture Group has been studying Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream. Shakespeare can be quite challenging but the group has been learning about the characters, themes and the



historical context of the play through art, drama and music.

The group developed artwork on the characters Oberon, Titania and Bottom, pictured here; this allowed them to develop their creative skills alongside literacy and team working. Group projects such as this are an excellent way for students to build confidence and resilience, and this is particularly important for students in our Nurture Group.



The Nurture Programme, which was launched in 2016, provides small-group support for new Year 7 students who need to build upon their academic skills, confidence and social skills before fully integrating into secondary school life. The initiative has been so successful that we have decided to expand both our facilities and provision to allow students to continue with this level of support in Year 8 if it is needed.

We have secured funding from *Durham County Council* to allow us to erect a
contemporary detached building with three
classrooms and independent facilities. Mr
Grieveson said, "The new hub means that
our young people will benefit from having a
consistent base and a family-type nurturing
environment which will help them make the
best start to their secondary education."

Driving forward Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths 🛚 🛂

Thanks to the efforts of our STEM Co-ordinators, our students benefit from a wide variety of learning activities, special events and experiences, all designed to inspire a passion for careers in Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths.

In July, we celebrated victory in the *EDT* (*Engineering Development Trust*) 'My Healthy School' competition, which was held at *Teesside University*.

The project saw teams of students working alongside local businesses to develop a new initiative which would promote good health in their school. Working in partnership with *Glaxo Smith Kline*, and with our STEM Co-ordinator, Miss Ford, who organised the activity, the girls identified diet as a priority for improving the overall health of young people. In response to this they came up with the idea of installing a self-serve salad bar in our Dinner Hall; this would not only give students an additional healthy option for lunch each day, but it would also help towards the recommended daily intake of fruit and vegetables.

As part of the project they conducted primary research to show that the concept would be both well received by their target audience and that it would also be financially viable. They talked to students across all year groups and the majority confirmed that the ability to choose the items they like, and therefore create their own personal salad, was very appealing.

In preparation for the competition final, the team designed a visual display to demonstrate their concept; they then presented their ideas to a panel of esteemed judges at the competition final to claim the trophy for King James. Each member of the team was also presented with the Bronze Industrial Cadet Award, which is the Science equivalent of the DofE Awards.

The course was hugely successful and as a result, this year we are extending our Sixth Form provision by offering a Level 3 qualification in Professional Cookery. This will ensure that our older students are qualified to take up one of the many professional apprenticeships in the industry.
